### Current Status and Key Issues

In 2000, the United
Nations and its Member
States set out a series
of eight time-bound
targets with a deadline of
end-2015, known as the
Millennium Development
Goals (MDGs). Two of
the eight Goals relate
to Maternal & Child
Health issues: MDG 4 —
reduce child mortality
and MDG 5 — improve
maternal health.

To date, progress on achieving MDG 4 and MDG 5 by end-2015 has varied across the African continent. Greater progress has been made on MDG 4.

- Maternal death rates continue to be driven by preventable issues arising during labor, which could be addressed with access to appropriate health professionals.
- Complications during birth affect the infant mortality rate (IMR); however, maternal health and access to services are also important factors.

The major challenges in making progress toward achieving MDG 4 and MDG 5 include the cost of providing access to high-quality healthcare across the large rural areas within many African countries, shortages and equitable distribution of skilled health workers, and social issues affecting women's propensity to use health services when available.

### Africa Healthcare Status – Where are we now?

Maternal & child health in Africa



In 2010 more women died in pregnancy in Sub-Saharan Africa than anywhere else in the world, with the region accounting for more than half (56%) of the 287,000 deaths recorded globally



42% of women aged 20 - 60 years in Sub-Saharan Africa are at risk of premature death, 7 times higher than their counterparts in affluent countries



Children in Sub-Saharan Africa are 17 times more likely to die than in developed regions, with 1-in-8 children dying before their fifth birthday



29% of global neonatal deaths occur in Africa



The number of children under five who died in Northern Africa increased by 37% between 1990 to 2010, globally the figure rose by just 9%

### Healthcare systems in Africa



Less than half of the women who give birth in Africa receive care from skilled personnel, stated African Health Ministers in 2012

In Kenya, there are only 2 doctors to care for every 10,000 people, compared to 24 doctors for every 10,000 people in the USA

A recent study in West Africa revealed only 1% of women had ever been screened for cervical cancer
